
Activity 1: Tone Set



Click on this video icon to learn about tone sets.


The notes used in a melody, written from the lowest note (found in the melody) to the highest note (found in the melody), are called a tone set.

This is the tone set of **Melodic Sightreading 6** below:



- The final note of the melody, in this case do, (sometimes called the "finalis") is circled in this tone set.
- Where there are three notes a step apart (do re mi) the lowest note will be do. Therefore, in **Melodic Sightreading 6**, F is do.

This is the tone set of **Melodic Sightreading 7**:



The three notes a step apart (do re mi) show us where do is.

Therefore, in Melodic Sightreading 7, G is do.
