Activity 1: The Minim



Click on this video icon to learn about the minim.





Click on this audio icon to hear **Trees** being sung with the words five times. Once you have listened several times, begin singing along with the song, pointing to these beat circles.

As you sing, write a stroke inside each beat circle where you begin a word.

Did you notice any words (sounds) that lasted for more than one beat?

This new rhythm is different to any we have learned because it lasts for **more** than one beat.





= **one** sound lasting for **two beats**

Its rhythm name is **to-o**

= minim rest

= half note rest

= a silence lasting for **two beats**.



Sing **Trees** in rhythm names, looking at the staff version of the song below, while conducting the 3 metre beat pattern. (Click on the audio file to hear this song sung in rhythm names if required).

Note the new tempo marking Andante which means at an easy walking pace

Activity 2: More Long Notes




Click on this audio icon to hear **The Long Note Lullaby** being sung with the words five times.

Listen, following the song's notation on the staff below. Once you have listened several times, begin singing along with the song.

There are two new rhythms in this song. For example, on the word "night" you will have sung a note that lasted for **three beats** and on the word "Sleep!" you will have sung a note that lasted for **four beats**.

The Long Note Lullaby



- = dotted minim (English Name)
 = dotted half note (American Name)
 = one sound lasting for three beats
 Its rhythm name is to-o-o
- = dotted minim rest
 = dotted half note rest
 = a silence lasting for three beats
- = semibreve (English Name)

 = whole note (American Name)

 = one sound lasting for four beats

 Its rhythm name is to-o-o-o
- = semibreve rest
 = whole note rest
 = a silence lasting for four beats (or the value of a whole bar)

Note - the **semibreve** or **whole note** gives notes their American names in 2, 3 and 4 metre. For example, a crotchet is worth one quarter of a whole note, therefore its American name is a quarter note.

A **trichord** is a group of three different pitches or notes. For example, *do re mi* is a trichord. Sing **Trichord Exercise 1** in solfa and in letter names.

Question 42: Rhythmic Dictation.



Transcribe this shorthand onto the staff using noteheads on the middle line, with stems going down. The first bar has been done for you.




Click on this audio icon to hear the rhythm for **Question 42: Rhythmic Dictation** played five times. Each playing will be preceded by four beats of click track.




Question 43: Trichords.
